I'm a student and, to earn a little bit of money, I do leafleting for local businesses. It's really <u>dull</u> work and quite tiring. I stand in the street all day on Saturday and give people leaflets for pizza restaurants, shops and children's play areas. Sometimes, the company I am working for gives me an <u>outfit</u> to put on – like a snail outfit for a French restaurant! I don't get paid much – £40 for a whole day. Sometimes, two of us work together. That's good because we can chat and laugh together.

I live in a small town and there aren't many part-time jobs for people of my age. In fact, there aren't any. That's why I work for myself. I do tutoring. I'm very good at Maths and Sciences and a lot of children need help with these subjects. I go to their homes after school and help them with homework or <u>revision</u>. I only tutor one child a day so I still get home by 5 p.m. I earn different amounts from different people. Some of the families don't have much money, so I don't charge much - but I never do it for free! When I have a lot of school work or when exams are coming up,

I don't have a regular job, but when I need money, I do babysitting. The great thing is that I can say 'Yes' or 'No'. It depends on what my plans are so I never miss any parties or concerts. I always work in the evening and it isn't hard work at all. The children I look after are asleep or getting ready for bed when I arrive. I tell them a story, switch their lights off and, after that, I can just sit and watch television. There is even food for me to eat and, for four hours, I earn £24.
